OFFERS DISCOUNTS ON PLUG-IN CARS

Officials from Garfield, Pitkin and Eagle counties gathered at the Holy Cross Energy headquarters in Glenwood Springs on March 15 to announce the launch of the Electric Vehicle Sales EVent: REV Up Your Ride, a three-month campaign to drive up purchases of electric vehicles.



For the sales event, running from April 1 to June 30, four auto dealerships are offering discounts on seven models of electric vehicles. Participating dealers are Audi Glenwood Springs, Mountain Chevrolet of Glenwood Springs, Co's BMW Center of Loveland, and Boulder Nissan.

For a limited time, the dealers will be offering discounts on plug-in electric and gasoline hybrids (PHEV) and on plugin battery electric vehicles (BEV). The discounts can be combined with the state of Colorado's tax credit (up to \$5,000) and federal tax credit (up to \$7,500) to significantly drive down the cost of a lease or purchase.

ENERGY SAVING TIPS



Unplug electronics and appliances when not in use

Did you know that some plugged-in electronics and appliances are still using energy even when turned off? This type of energy is called "phantom" or "vampire" energy and can account for about 10% of your monthly utility bill. Save energy by pulling the plug — from the wall outlet — on your electronics and appliances when not in use.

Unplug your heat tape for the spring and summer

The energy use of typical heat tape is six to nine watts per foot. That means each 100 feet of heat tape operating 24/7 can translate to an added monthly cost of \$41 to \$62. Consider putting heat tape on a timer, running it during the day and turning it off at night. The timer could cut your heat tape electricity costs in half. HCE offers a \$100 rebate for a hardwired timer. Remember to turn off your heat tape in the spring when the last of the snow is off your roof.

Learn about Colorado's electric vehicle rebates

Considering a new car? There's never been a better time to get an electric vehicle (EV). With up to \$12,500 in State and Federal tax credits available this year, Colorado has the best subsidies in the country. And it just got better with a local group buy program that could shave off as much as \$8,000 more.

"The EV Sales EVent goal is for the dealerships to sell at least 50 electric vehicles to residents and businesses in the three counties," said Vail Town Councilwoman Kim Langmaid. The Sales EVent also set a goal of increasing public charging stations in the region by 25 percent, growing the current number of 160 stations to 200 by year's end.

Compared to other transportation fuels, electricity is the cheapest. In Colorado, the average price of gasoline is currently about \$2.32/gallon (as of 4/13/17), while the price of electricity purchased from HCE is \$0.94/eGallon. EV's also have fewer moving parts and are often much simpler than a conventional vehicle. No oil changes are required, brakes last longer, and maintenance costs can be cut in half according to energy.gov.

"Electric vehicles are shifting the transportation fuel market away from oil and toward electricity, a domestic energy source," said Glenwood Springs City Councilman Stephen Bershenyi. "That supports Colorado electric utilities and their fuel providers, he said, and raises consumer demand for more renewable energy."

SUCCESS STORY: BRIAN HUEBNER

In 2016, Brian Huebner purchased a 60-year old house in Eagle. He knew it wasn't going to be the most energy efficient house in town. Brian saw a newspaper ad about Colorado's Affordable Residential Energy (CARE) program and called Energy Smart Colorado in Eagle County. Brian said, "I knew I had to act now, or pay the price down the line."

John-Ryan Lockman, Walking Mountains Science Center Energy Programs Director, came to his home, took measurements, looked in the attic for proper insulation levels and took note of everything from the water heater to the windows. One thing that caught John-Ryan's eye was the dust marks on the ceiling which showed where the ceiling joists were located. When a ceiling gets cold, the moisture in the air will condense on the ceiling and dust sticks to it. A cold ceiling is a sure sign that there is inadequate insulation.

Lack of insulation was identified as the biggest energy hog in Brian's home. CARE sent a local energy professional to address all the holes and gaps in the attic floor. He added over 10 inches of insulation to Brian's attic bringing the insulation value to R-49.

Brian noticed the comfort level in his home increased instantly. "It (CARE) is a wonderful program. Now I can spend my money elsewhere in the community rather than on wasted energy," said Brian.

CARE leverages Energy Outreach Colorado funding, Black Hills and Holy Cross Energy rebates, and local resources to provide FREE energy efficiency services to participants.

Along with saving energy, Brian was interested in using renewable sources of energy. Though he didn't have the capital to install solar panels on his home, he knew that a community solar garden was available to offset his electric use.

Brian applied to GRID Alternatives Income-Qualified Solar Program. GRID Alternatives in conjunction with Holy Cross Energy offers solar at no cost to qualified applicants for a two-year period. This program may reduce the participant's annual electric bill by up to 50%. Combined with the weatherization work, Brian's home is now more comfortable and his electric bill is significantly reduced.

DON'T BLOCK THE BOX

Every year, Holy Cross Energy has to cut down trees and bushes that are planted in front of our pad-mounted transformers. To avoid this, please don't plant trees or bushes that will grow to within 10 feet of doors or within four feet of the sides of transformer boxes. Low growing flowers in front of the transformer are fine.

Trees planted under power lines can also be a problem. Holy Cross Energy is required to follow federal vegetation management guidelines to keep our overhead lines clear of trees. There are a variety of trees that do not grow tall enough to impact our lines. Please contact Holy Cross Energy or your local nursery for advice on which trees are best for planting under power lines.
